

U.S. vs. Canada Warranty Compliance Snapshot

Warranty Disclosure Requirements

Federal Law Framework

United States: Magnuson-Moss Warranty Act (FTC)

Canada: No single federal law; requirements vary by province

Disclosure Format

United States: Written, clear, and conspicuous language required

Canada: Written documentation, often bilingual (English/French)

Timing Requirements

United States: Must be provided before purchase is completed

Canada: Must be available in-store and online upfront



Language and Labeling Standards

United States

Language: English is standard across all states

Penalties: Federal Trade Commission can issue fines and cease-and-desist orders for non-compliance

Canada

Language: Bilingual documentation (English + French) required in most provinces

Labeling: Quebec mandates French labeling under Bill 96 with strict enforcement

Penalties: Provincial fines, potential lawsuits, and takedown notices for violations

Privacy and Data Protection Landscape

Consumer data handling is a critical compliance area that differs substantially between the two countries. Understanding these distinctions is vital when collecting warranty registration information or processing claims.

United States

Governing Laws: State-based regulations including California Consumer Privacy Act (CCPA) and California Privacy Rights Act (CPRA)

Consent Requirements: Yes, but varies significantly by state jurisdiction

Enforcement: State Attorneys General and Federal Trade Commission

Canada

Governing Laws: Federal PIPEDA (Personal Information Protection and Electronic Documents Act), plus Bill 64 in Quebec

Consent Requirements: Yes - explicit consent required with strict data storage rules

Enforcement: Office of the Privacy Commissioner (OPC), CNIL, FSRA (Ontario), Quebec privacy office

Key Regulatory Enforcement Bodies

Multiple agencies oversee warranty compliance across North America. Knowing which authorities regulate your business activities helps ensure proper adherence to all applicable rules and prevents costly enforcement actions.



Federal Trade Commission (FTC)

Primary U.S. federal agency enforcing the Magnuson-Moss Warranty Act and consumer protection standards nationwide



State Attorneys General

U.S. state-level enforcement of consumer protection laws, with varying requirements by jurisdiction



Competition Bureau

Canada's federal agency overseeing fair business practices and misleading advertising related to warranties



Provincial Regulators

Canadian provincial bodies including FSRA (Ontario), Office of the Privacy Commissioner, and Quebec's OQLF

Critical Non-Compliance Risks

Avoiding common pitfalls is essential for maintaining compliance and protecting your business from regulatory action. These violations can result in significant fines, legal disputes, and reputational damage.

Selling warranties in Quebec without French documentation

Quebec's Bill 96 strictly requires French-language warranty materials. Non-compliance can trigger immediate takedown orders and substantial provincial fines.

Failing to disclose warranty terms before sale completion

Both jurisdictions require pre-purchase disclosure. Hidden or delayed warranty terms violate consumer protection laws.

Using insurance-like terminology without proper licensing

Marketing warranties with language suggesting insurance coverage without appropriate licensing violates both U.S. and Canadian regulations.

Collecting consumer data without valid consent

Warranty registration that captures personal information without explicit, informed consent breaches privacy regulations.



Quebec: The Compliance Wild Card

Quebec presents unique challenges for warranty compliance due to its distinct legal system and language requirements. Bill 96, enacted to strengthen French language protections, has significant implications for businesses.

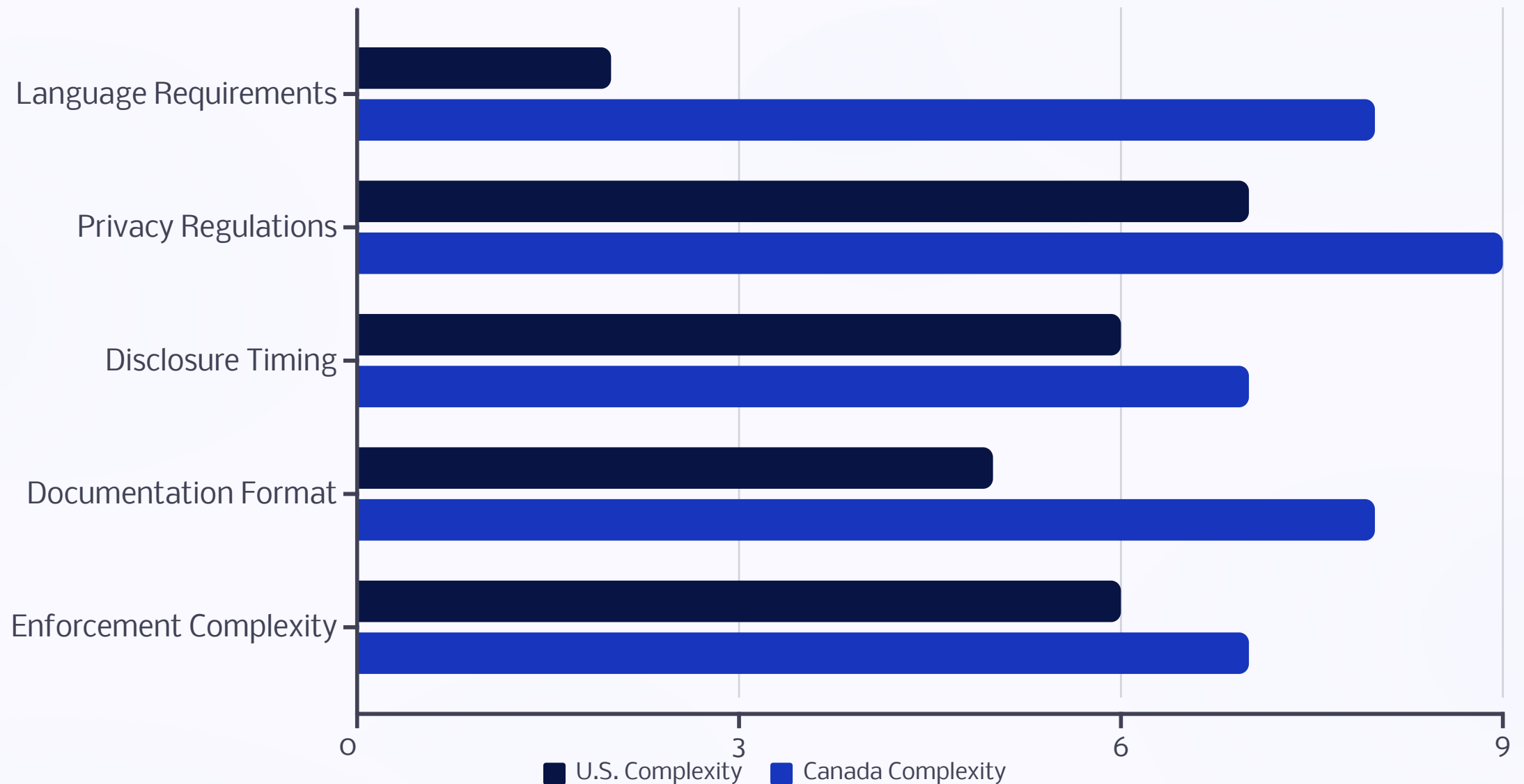
Key Quebec Requirements

- All warranty documents must be available in French
- French text must be at least as prominent as English
- Contracts and agreements require French versions
- Website warranty information must display French prominently

Enforcement

The Office québécois de la langue française (OQLF) actively monitors compliance and can issue fines starting at \$1,500 for individuals and \$7,000 for corporations.
